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A MESSAGE FROM OUR CHAIR

2024 was pivotal for the Prague Centre for Media Skills. As our flagship project Promoting Human Rights in the Digital Era, supported by Norway Grants, was drawing to a close we made significant strides in embedding the experience of this initiative into our long-term strategy. The culmination of this project marked more than just the end of a funding cycle—it laid the groundwork for a sustained commitment to media ethics, digital rights, and responsible communication in an age of rapid technological change.

The launch of the TechWatch initiative, designed to monitor the impact of emerging technologies on media and democracy, deepened our bilateral cooperation with Norwegian academic and civil society partners. PCMS organised expert seminars in Oslo, Bodø, and public events in Prague. TechWatch resulted in new educational resources and expanded our advocacy for accessible and ethical media. The project brought together journalists, students, coders, and policymakers—exactly the kind of interdisciplinary collaboration we believe is necessary to meet the challenges of our digital age.

In addition, PCMS maintained its long-standing support for free and independent journalism through mentoring, training, and strategic partnerships. We continued our engagement with dissident voices from repressive regimes, especially from the post-Soviet space, and strengthened our advocacy for media accessibility and digital inclusion. These efforts reflect our belief that democracy depends on informed and empowered citizens—and that access to accurate, ethical, and inclusive information is a human right.

Looking ahead, the task is clear. We must ensure that the digital future is one that serves people, not just platforms or states. We must champion media ecosystems that are resilient, inclusive, and anchored in human rights. At PCMS, we are ready to build that future—together with our partners, supporters, and the growing community of responsible communicators across Europe and beyond.

I would like to thank my PCMS colleagues, and also everyone who has supported us, in joining

me in this endeavour.

OUR MISSION AND GOALS

The State of the World

Democracy is in decline worldwide, and Europe is no exception. Most reports reveal alarming trends: electoral integrity is eroding, civil liberties are shrinking, and the rule of law is under increasing pressure.

Disinformation, dark money, and systemic failures further fuel democratic backsliding. The influence of social media platforms—where engagement-driven algorithms amplify sensationalist and misleading content—has made trust in traditional media more fragile than ever. Political polarization is at an all-time high, making consensus-driven governance increasingly difficult. Moreover, the professionalization of politics has distanced decision—making from the public, creating widespread dissatisfaction with democratic performance.

Journalism, once the backbone of democratic accountability, faces existential threats. Press freedoms are being curtailed under the guise of national security, while misinformation spreads unchecked. In parts of Europe, independent media outlets struggle against legal harassment, financial precarity, and intimidation. These developments make the role of free, responsible journalism more crucial than ever.

At the Prague Centre for Media Skills (PCMS), our mission is to promote fair, inclusive, and informed societies through high-quality journalism and communication. Our goals are rooted in the fundamental principles of human rights, journalistic ethics, rule of law, democracy, inclusion, equality, sustainability, and respect for individual rights and aspirations.

PCMS's Mission: Confronting These Challenges

The **Prague Centre for Media Skills (PCMS)** is an international group of professionals committed to fostering fair, democratic, and well-informed societies. Our mission is to advance interdisciplinary dialogue on communication, media, technology, and their impact on society. As democratic values face increasing pressure across Europe and beyond, and civil society struggles to make its voice heard, our work has never been more critical.

PCMS is dedicated to **strengthening high-quality journalism**, **enhancing media literacy**, **and advocating for responsible communication**. We equip experts and students with the tools to navigate the evolving media landscape, providing training, mentoring, and study tours that focus on the intersection of digitalization, technology, societal impact, and human rights. Through the **#TechWatch Project**, we monitor emerging technologies to analyze their influence on media and democracy, ensuring that Al and digital tools serve the public interest rather than undermine it.

Democracy cannot thrive without **a strong and independent civic sphere**. PCMS actively supports initiatives that amplify the voices of civil society and those at the forefront of defending democratic freedoms. In 2024, we co-organized a tour for two Russian dissident activists, bringing their stories and experiences to Czech audiences to highlight the importance of **civic resilience and media independence in authoritarian environments.** This initiative reflects our longstanding commitment to engaging with the post-Soviet space, a key focus at the time of PCMS's foundation and one we continue to return to as democratic struggles in the region intensify.

Disinformation and media manipulation remain persistent threats, eroding trust in democratic institutions. PCMS actively works to counter these issues by developing **media literacy initiatives** that empower citizens to critically engage with information. By collaborating with policymakers, educators, and media organizations, we help shape best practices for responsible journalism in the digital age.

Access to reliable information is a cornerstone of democracy. Through research, publications, and advocacy, PCMS champions press freedom and the ethical use of digital media. We also focus on ensuring that democratic participation is inclusive, supporting initiatives that amplify marginalized voices—particularly young people, minorities, and vulnerable communities. Our work provides journalists with essential guidance on accessibility and human rights, ensuring diverse perspectives are reflected in media coverage.

Recognizing the global nature of these challenges, PCMS fosters **international professional dialogues** to strengthen democratic media landscapes across Europe and beyond. We collaborate with universities, NGOs, and civil society networks to uphold journalism's and civic society's role as a watchdog against democratic erosion.

As we look to the future, PCMS remains steadfast in its mission to equip media professionals and citizens with the knowledge and skills needed to safeguard democratic principles, support independent civic voices, and foster resilient societies in an increasingly complex information environment.



PCMS PROJECTS IN 2024

1. Promoting Human Rights in the Digital Era

From January 2022 to January 2024, PCMS participated in the Promoting Human Rights in the Digital Era project, a groundbreaking initiative designed to strengthen journalistic capacity in addressing human rights challenges posed by modern technology. Implemented by a consortium of Czech academic, nonprofit, and media institutions in collaboration with the Norwegian partner Electronic Frontier Norway (EFN) and funded by Norway Funds (No. LP-HRMGSA-017), the project aimed to bridge the critical knowledge gap in media education concerning digitalization, artificial intelligence, and their societal and human rights implications.

The COVID-19 pandemic underscored the dual nature of digital technologies—while they enable connectivity and innovation, they also pose significant risks to privacy, non-discrimination, and freedom of expression, among others. The rapid expansion of Al, algorithmic decision—making, and biometric surveillance has amplified these risks, disproportionately affecting vulnerable communities. However, journalists lacked the necessary training to effectively report on these issues, weakening public awareness and democratic accountability.

To tackle this challenge, the project sought to:

- Enhance the capacity of journalists and media professionals to identify and analyze human rights abuses resulting from digital technologies.
- Develop a pioneering educational module at Charles University's Faculty of Social Sciences (FSV UK)—the first long-term course in the Czech Republic dedicated to media, technology, and human rights.
- **Produce accessible training resources** for both journalism students and working professionals, ensuring long-term impact beyond academia.
- Foster collaboration between Czech and Norwegian experts, leveraging interdisciplinary insights from law, technology, and media studies.
- The project was structured into several **key phases**:
- **Baseline Research** Conducted a <u>nationwide study</u> on Czech journalists' awareness and reporting practices regarding digital rights and discrimination.

- Academic Integration Developed and launched a <u>one-semester journalism course</u> at Charles University, <u>addressing</u> digital surveillance, Al ethics, algorithmic discrimination, and the role of media in mitigating human rights abuses.
- Knowledge Dissemination Organized two high-profile conferences in Prague (2022 and 2023), engaging media professionals, human rights advocates, tech sector experts, and policymakers in discussions on technology's societal impact.
- Training Resources Created an <u>online video training series</u> and a journalist's handbook in <u>Czech</u> and <u>English</u>, providing practical guidance on reporting human rights violations linked to technology. These resources were made freely available to Czech and Norwegian media practitioners.

Key Outputs and Impact

- **First-of-its-kind university course**: More than 50 journalism students at Charles University participated in the semester-long program, now integrated into the university's regular curriculum.
- Groundbreaking research findings: The baseline study exposed gaps in journalists' understanding of digital rights issues, reinforcing the urgent need for specialized training.
- Cross-sectoral dialogue: The project's final symposium brought together 80+ experts, policymakers, and journalists from across Europe, influencing national and international discussions on Al governance and press freedom.
- Practical training materials: The online educational video series and journalist's handbook provided critical tools for improving digital rights reporting, benefiting professionals in both Czechia and Norway.



Sustained Commitment Beyond the Project

- While the project formally concluded in **January 2024**, its impact continues.
- The journalism course remains a permanent fixture at Charles University, ensuring future generations of journalists receive essential training in technology and human rights.
- The training resources continue to be widely used by media professionals, educators, and civil society organizations. Check the <u>guidelines for journalists</u> coordinated by PCMS and its 2 educational videos.

- PCMS and its partners maintain ongoing engagement with Norwegian experts, strengthening cross-border cooperation on digital rights.

By concluding **Promoting Human Rights in the Digital Era**, PCMS laid the groundwork for strengthening the role of media in addressing the human rights challenges posed by emerging technologies. The findings and methodologies developed during the project have directly informed the next phase of our work—the **TechWatch Project**, launched in late 2023.



2. TechWatch Project

The <u>#TechWatch project</u> builds on the insights gained from our collaboration with Czech and Norwegian partners within the <u>Promoting Human Rights in the Digital Era</u> project and expands the dialogue on digital rights beyond the Czech Republic. This initiative **deepens Czech-Norwegian cooperation** by bringing the lessons learned to Norwegian youth, experts, and civil society. It continues the mission of equipping journalists and media professionals with the tools to critically assess and report on the intersection of technology, democracy, and human rights.

Building on PCMS's commitment to responsible journalism and democratic resilience, TechWatch brought to Norway with Norwegian partners EFN (<u>Electronic Frontier Norway</u>) research-based insights, fosters dialogue among experts, and formulates recommendations to ensure that digital transformation aligns with democratic principles and human rights standards.

Activities and Outputs

1) Norway Engagements (February 2024)

As part of the project's international outreach, PCMS organized a series of **seminars and exchanges in Norway** (Oslo, Mo i Rana, Bødo) in February 2024, engaging with local experts, students, and media professionals on the intersection of technology, media, and human rights. Hosted in collaboration with Norwegian partners, these discussions tackled critical topics such as:

- The **role of artificial intelligence in journalism** and the human rights and societal challenges it presents.
- **Algorithmic bias and misinformation**, examining how automated systems influence public discourse.
- **Digital surveillance and data privacy**, with a focus on balancing security needs with human rights.
- The **impact of emerging technologies on press freedom**, including an overview from the Cold War times in newsrooms to the risks of Al-generated disinformation campaigns targeting independent media.

These seminars fostered an exchange of perspectives between Czech and Norwegian experts, allowing participants to compare national approaches and develop strategies for mitigating technology-driven risks to democracy.

2) Online Expert Panel (March 2024)

Following the in-person engagements, PCMS co-hosted an <u>online panel discussion in March 2024</u> in collaboration with the EFN and the Arctic University of Norway. The panel brought together human rights advocates, technology researchers, corporate communications and media professionals to explore the evolving relationship between digital innovation and fundamental rights.

The discussion emphasized:

- How new technologies are reshaping civic participation, particularly in countries experiencing democratic backsliding.
- The responsibility of tech companies and policymakers in ensuring transparency and accountability in algorithmic decision-making.
- The risks of Al-generated propaganda and deepfakes, particularly in politically sensitive contexts such as elections and conflicts.
- Strategies for equipping journalists and civil society organizations with tools to detect and counteract digital manipulation.

The panel reinforced TechWatch's role as a **platform for interdisciplinary dialogue**, bridging the gap between media, academia, private sector and civil society in understanding and mitigating technology's influence on human rights.



3) Publication of the TechWatch Comprehensive Report (April 2024)

In April 2024, PCMS published the <u>TechWatch Final Comprehensive Report</u>, a key outcome of the project that consolidates research, expert discussions, and policy recommendations on the impact of digital technologies on human rights and democracy. The report serves as a critical resource for policymakers, journalists, and civil society actors, offering a structured approach to mitigating technology-related risks while reinforcing democratic values.

Key Takeaways from the Report

- 1. Human Rights as the Guiding Framework for Technology Governance
 - The report emphasizes that **human rights—not ethics—must serve as the foundation for assessing and regulating technology**. Ethical guidelines often lack enforceability, while human rights frameworks provide clear, legally binding obligations to protect privacy, freedom of expression, and non-discrimination.
 - The study debunks common myths about human rights in technology governance, reaffirming their adaptability and necessity in regulating AI, cybersecurity, and digitalization.
- 2. Al and Automation: Risks to Fundamental Rights
 - Al-driven decision-making systems can reinforce bias, restrict personal autonomy, and amplify digital exclusion. Without proper safeguards, Al tools used in hiring, law enforcement, and content moderation risk violating antidiscrimination laws and undermining democratic participation.
 - The EU Al Act and the Council of Europe's Al and Human Rights Convention are highlighted as essential regulatory frameworks that set transparency, accountability, and oversight requirements for Al deployment.
- 3. Cybersecurity and Surveillance: A Human Rights Concern
 - The report underscores that cybersecurity is not just a technical issue—it is a human rights challenge. Overly broad cybersecurity laws and digital surveillance measures threaten freedom of expression, privacy, and the right to dissent.
 - Recommendations include banning biometric mass surveillance, enforcing data protection laws, supporting encryption and strengthening public accountability mechanisms for cybersecurity policies.
- 4. Media and Misinformation: Safeguarding Trust in the Digital Age
 - Al-driven content curation and algorithmic bias contribute to declining trust in legacy media and the spread of disinformation.
 - The report calls for stronger media literacy initiatives, increased transparency in content moderation policies, and stricter accountability measures for tech platforms to prevent AI from undermining democratic discourse.
- 5. Inclusion and Accessibility in the Digital World

- The report advocates for digital accessibility as a fundamental human right, highlighting the risks of digital exclusion for older populations, people with disabilities, and marginalized communities – but not only them.
- It supports the "right to analogue"—ensuring that individuals who choose not to engage with digital technologies are not disadvantaged in accessing essential services.
- 6. Multistakeholder Cooperation for a Rights-Respecting and Human-Centred Digital Future
 - The report stresses that governments, civil society, media, and academia must work together to counteract technological threats to democracy.
 - It recommends international cooperation on Al regulation, cross-border digital rights protections, and public-private partnerships to hold tech companies accountable for human rights impacts.

The #TechWatch project was supported by the Open Society Fund Prague, Committee of Good Will – Olga Havel Foundation and Czech Scouting Institute within the Active Citizens Fund program, which promotes citizens' active participation in the public life and decision making and builds capacities of civil society organizations. The program was financed by the EEA and Norway Grants.



PCMS OTHER ACTIVITIES IN 2024

1. Participation in Key Conferences & Meetings

PCMS remained actively engaged in key international and national discussions throughout 2024, contributing expertise on media, technology, and human rights:

- Exploring Digital Exclusion and Human Rights (January) At an OSF Foundation session, PCMS joined Czech librarians to discuss barriers to digital access and the role of libraries in digital inclusion.
- <u>Unlock Resilience in Wartime</u> (May) <u>PCMS attended</u> this Prague Civil Society Centre
 event, which explored strategies to support independent journalism and civil society in
 times of conflict.
- European Press Prize Award Ceremony (June) PCMS joined leading European media professionals in <u>celebrating excellence in journalism</u> and the role of the press in upholding democratic values.
- Amplifying Russian voices advocating for freedom of speech (September 2024) –
 jointly with the Czech Office of the Government and the Czech branch of Memorial,
 PCMS facilitated a visit of Russian democracy activists, Irina Ščerbakova and Olga Misik
 to Czechia.
- Discussion at the Czech Parliament (November) PCMS participated in a parliamentary discussion on the role of public media in countering disinformation, advocating for stronger support for independent journalism.
- Prague Media Point 2024 (November) PCMS took part in discussions on the volatility of media in the AI era, addressing the challenges and risks posed by artificial intelligence to journalism and democratic discourse. A video summary and key messages from our participation were published in December 2024.
- Societal Polarization and the Anti-Gender Movement (December) Organized by the Czech Office to the Government, PCMS provided expertise in this <u>seminar</u> <u>examining the role of media</u> in shaping societal debates on gender and human rights.

2. Collaborative Research Initiatives

PCMS contributed to key research efforts aimed at understanding the intersection of media, education, and digital rights:

• **Digital Exclusion and Human Rights** (January 2024) – <u>PCMS collaborated</u> with <u>Czech librarians</u> at an OSF Foundation session to explore the link between digital exclusion and

fundamental rights, reinforcing the need for inclusive access to information in the digital age.

Czech Teachers and Media Education (April-May 2024) – PCMS provided expertise
and consultation for this <u>qualitative research</u> project led by Palacký University in
Olomouc, analyzing how teachers navigate media education in the Czech Republic.



3. Networks and Membership

PCMS strengthened its engagement with democracy-focused networks and advocacy initiatives in 2024:

- <u>Network for the Protection of Democracy</u> PCMS joined this <u>network in November</u>
 <u>2024</u> and later contributed to an expert statement on defending democratic institutions.
- Public Media Advocacy PCMS endorsed a petition supporting public media
 (November 17, 2024), emphasizing the need for independent journalism in democratic societies.
- Centre for Innovations in Technology, Art, and Humanities (<u>TAH</u>) PCMS became
 a signatory of its <u>manifesto</u> (October 2024), advocating for ethical and human rightsbased approaches to technology and communication.
- Committee Leadership: PCMS's Programme Director became Chairwoman of the <u>Committee for Modern Technology and Human Rights</u> in July 2024, reinforcing our role in shaping digital rights policies.
